I am writing to voice my strong opposition to Item 10 Agenda and hope you will reconsider the tremendous value Reid-Hillview Airport has for the community.

I emigrated to San Jose in 1980. I purchased my first plane in 1982 and paid a local flight instructor to train me while I kept it at Reid-Hillview Airport.

I am now on my third plane and am still at Reid-Hillview, 42 years later.

I grew up in London England, lived in a Victorian terraced house that had lead pipes throughout the water supply system.

No doubt I have some lead in my body, but I will turn 72 in June and am in much better shape than most younger people.

I have never smoked, don't drink, I don't do drugs, I try to get a good night's rest and am doing just fine. I still have my pilots medical.

The lead studies that the county keeps funding with my tax dollars are quite pathetic. Any knowledgeable historian will tell you that we have been polluting our bodies with lead for thousands of years and yet here we all are. There are many toxins out there, but lead is not a major issue today. The quantity released by all the airplanes transitioning at Reid-Hillview in any month might be measurable with today's technology, but I doubt that it will affect people's health. As competitive studies have shown the soil lead levels around the bay area are virtually identical to the area around Reid-Hillview Airport.
